# THE FALL SURVEY 2024: UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT INFORMATION

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## The Fall Survey

In fall 2023, Student Affairs Assessment and Planning launched The Fall Survey in partnership the Office of Institutional Research. This survey replaces the Entering Student Survey that was last administered in fall 2018. The Fall survey is administered to undergraduate UIC students and has three components: 1) student information; 2) intervention questions; and 3) student learning outcomes assessment data. This 2024 version has made some changes to the survey to improve wording and adding additional questions. This report presents the student information data. Student information questions reflect information frequently needed/requested by the university community that is not currently collected elsewhere. This is the second year that the survey was administered, and it is planned to be an annual survey.

The Fall 2024 survey was disseminated through Qualtrics to all undergraduate students from September 11, 2024 to October 15, 2024. A total of 7,118 students completed the survey representing 34% of the undergraduate student population at that time. Student surveys were linked to their UINs so their information could be connected to other campus data sources.

The report first presents the demographic information of the students that completed the survey. These additional data come from the student data warehouse. Next, each student information question is presented. Given UIC's emphasis on creating educational equity among our students, and our achievement gaps by race/ethnicity, where appropriate, these questions are disaggregated by race/ethnicity. Although all students are included in the totals, we do not provide disaggregated data for student groups with small numbers, such as American Indian/Alaskan Native, to protect privacy of those students.

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## **Student Respondent Characteristics**

Student demographic breakdown of respondents is presented below. Most data are from the student data warehouse. Students were also asked in the survey if they identified as Middle Eastern/North African (MENA) as this is not available for all undergraduate students in the data warehouse, which is reflected in the expanded categories of race/ethnicity seen in Table 1 and used throughout the report.

## **Employment Status**

Students provided information about their current employment. About half of students worked while in school, with students more likely to work off-campus than on-campus. There is variation in employment status and hours work by race and ethnicity.

## Language

Students indicated if English was their first language. For those who said no, they were asked what their first language was. Out of approximately 100 languages represented, the top languages for students whose first language is not English are presented in Table 9. Among UIC undergraduate students who completed this survey, 40% reported that English was not their first language.

#### **Students Who Parent**

Students are asked if they have children. For those who say that they are parents, they are asked the number of children that they have, as well as the ages of the children. For the ages of the children, this question is about the children, and not the respondents, so that information is not disaggregated by race/ethnicity. Among respondents, 2% reported that they are student parents.

#### **Students Who Are Caretakers**

Students are asked if they are caretakers for a family member, for at least part-time. For those who say that they are caretakers for a family member, they are asked to write-in who they care for. Responses for who student caretakers care for were grouped and are displayed in Table 14. Students were able to write-in multiple people that they care for. Among the students who participated in the survey, 6% were caretakers for family members.

# **Military-Affiliated Students**

Students are asked about their military-affiliation. For students that are military-affiliated, they indicated their affiliation, as seen in Table 16. Students were able to select multiple military statuses and affiliations. For those who are military-affiliated, being a dependent of a veteran/service member, a reserve, or a veteran were the most common.
